

Seasonal Designs



As one enters the Gasper home, crafting beauty meets the eye everywhere, displaying Connie's skills in so many art forms. Mrs. Gasper is a woman of many talents, some of which have evolved over time. Many years ago, Connie's grandmother shared her love and skill with a variety of crafts including crocheting and rug hooking. For over thirty years, Connie has created many beautiful seasonal mats, rugs, pillows and runners in spare moments. Recently with the 'aide' of You Tube, Connie refreshed her knowledge of the blanket stitch as she searched for a way to appliqué the simple designs for which her pillow shawls are known.

How did the pillow shawl come to be? Interestingly it was in determining a special thank you gift for a friend. The gift could not be a hooked creation, because Connie's friend was an expert in the art of hooked rugs. With time passing and while away on vacation. Connie saw a pillow which had a Velcro band around it. An idea began to percolate...quality black wool, seasonal appliqués (blanket stitched), ties formed from wool using her rug cutter. The idea for a pillow shawl took form. Connie's friend, an artisan herself. was so pleased, she showed Connie's pillow shawl to her employer, Gary Chapman, co-owner of The Pine Cone Gift Shoppe in North Canton which specializes in primitive, colonial and farmhouse décor. A simple idea, a labor of gratitude has indeed blessed Connie's life, who is now an artisan in her own right. In oneand one-half years, 471 pillow shawls have been completed. Inspiration is abundant...seasons, primitive sheep, holidays, patriotic themes and more. The most popular designs are the black face sheep and the holly berries and holly. Now, Connie purchases quality wool by the bolt. She has found doing so with her friend is much more cost effective when compared with early purchases of wool from Amish country which ran to \$40 a YARD. A Cricut machine assures pattern uniformity. Much time and thought has gone into the production of Mrs. Gasper's designs. Over time Connie has developed a rhythm and system of work. Once an idea takes form, one shawl requires anywhere from two to three hours to complete. Connie's skills have taken her on a new path as a recognized artisan who now finds joy working part time on Thursdays at The Pine Cone Gift Shoppe. She has a contract with Mr. Chapman to make the shawls exclusively for his business. The personalized labels on the shawls rightly recognize a woman of many talents! The College Club of Canton is pleased to recognize Connie Gasper, artisan, AND Treasurer for our organization.

Were you a part of the CCC contingent who enjoyed an evening at the Palace Theatre? Those present had an opportunity to enjoy the lilting music provided by Jay Spencer prior to a silent movie which featured some of the special sound effects featured on the Kilgen Organ. Mr. Spencer and Executive Director Georgia Paxos shared historical facts about the building of the Palace. Attention was called to the two giraffe plaques located above the proscenium arch paying tribute to Harry Harper Ink whose bequest enabled the building of The Canton Palace Theatre. Ink was owner of Tonsiline Company, makers of a cough syrup marketed in giraffe-shaped bottles!



Ms. Paxos called attention to the auditorium area which re-creates a Spanish courtyard on a midsummer night. "Its ceiling, a starry night with wisps of clouds, creates a dream effect. The Palace still has the original cloud machine that makes the clouds march continuously across the sky."

Interesting Facts: The Palace's screen remains the largest movie screen in Canton at 21' x 46'.

One of the most famous attractions of the Palace Theatre is the Kilgen Pipe Organ. It is one of only a few left in the country and the only one left that remains in its original home.
