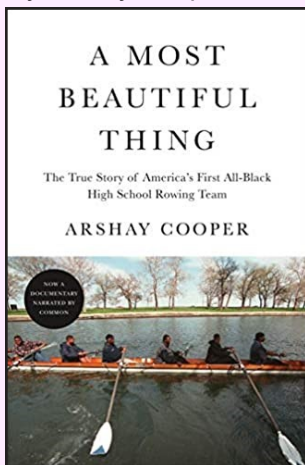

Women Bridging the Centuries . . .

Continuing our series on the progress of women during the last hundred years, we are delighted to take up where we left off in the November issue of *Chatter*. We hope some of these accomplishments will pique your interest in reading more about how these women achieved excellence in their specific fields.



1993 ~ Toni Morrison, born in Lorain OH, was the first African American woman to win the Nobel Prize in literature.

Some of her well-known works were *Song of Solomon*, *Beloved* and *Jazz*.

2009 ~ Elouise Pepion Cobell, a Niitsitapi Blackfoot Confederacy tribal elder, was lead plaintiff in a class action lawsuit against the federal government for mismanagement of funds belonging to a half million Native Americans. The government paid a \$3.4 billion settlement.



1997 ~ Madeleine Albright

became the first female Secretary of State under the 42nd President Bill Clinton.

On October 23, 2000, she became the first Secretary of State to visit North Korea.



2010 ~ Kathryn Bigelow

became the first woman to win an Oscar for best director for the Iraq war film "The Hurt Locker."



2001 ~ Condoleezza Rice was named National Security Advisor by 43rd President George W. Bush. She was later to serve as the 66th Secretary of State, becoming the first Black woman to serve in that role.

She is currently Director of the Hoover Institution at Stanford University.

2013 ~ Edith Windsor was a gay rights activist whose fight for same sex marriage led to a landmark US ruling. She led the fight for federal benefits for same-sex couples.



2007 ~ California Representative Nancy Pelosi became the first woman to serve as speaker of the House of Representatives in 2019.

According to the House Historian records, she set the record for the longest speech on February 7, 2018 ~ a little over eight hours!



2016 ~ Hillary Rodham Clinton became the first woman to be the presidential nominee of a major political party.

2020 ~ Kamala Harris was one of six women who ran for Democratic nominee for president. Joe Biden chose her for his vice-president.



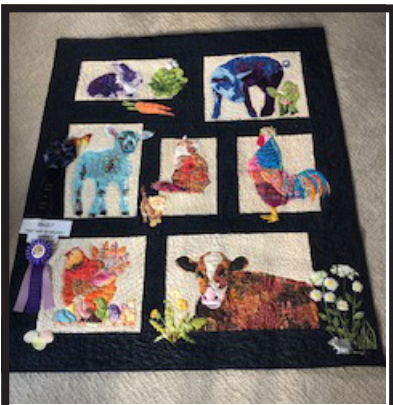

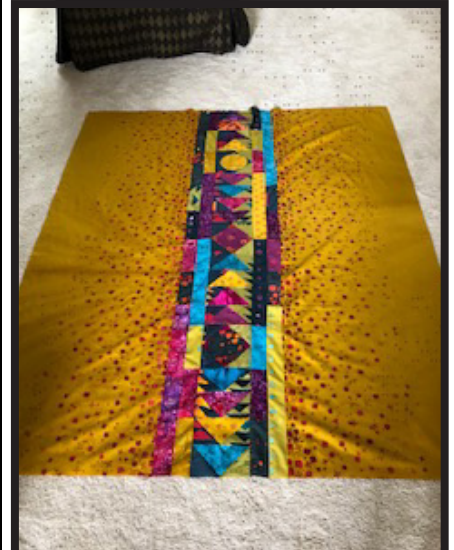
BRUMBAUGH MENAGERIE

This skill was further developed through participation in 4H activities. Judi has had her work displayed at a number of juried competitions where she has won recognition. Recently her work was displayed at Massillon Museum.

Over the years Judi has enjoyed countless hours designing, crafting and completing quilts of all sizes and shapes. Four of those pictured on this page have a story to tell.

- The Quilts of Valor have been made for many service veterans.
- The 1st Day of Spring was inspired on a trip to Africa where early in the morning a leopard was enjoying a morning snack.
- The Museum of Tribal Dance quilt represents ‘sewing outside the box,’ an opportunity to experiment with silk, cotton and hand dyed batiks. It was displayed at Massillon Museum in the Stark County juried art show and is now accepted in the *American Quilt Show* in Daytona Florida this February!
- The Wedding Ring quilt was a wedding gift to her granddaughter Caitlin. (CCC member Linda Bayda is Caitlyn’s other grandmother.) The quilt took over 100 hours to complete. Judi’s sister Jackie VanHouten did the quilting. This piece was shown in the juried art show in Stark County and *The American Quilt Show* in Paducah Kentucky.

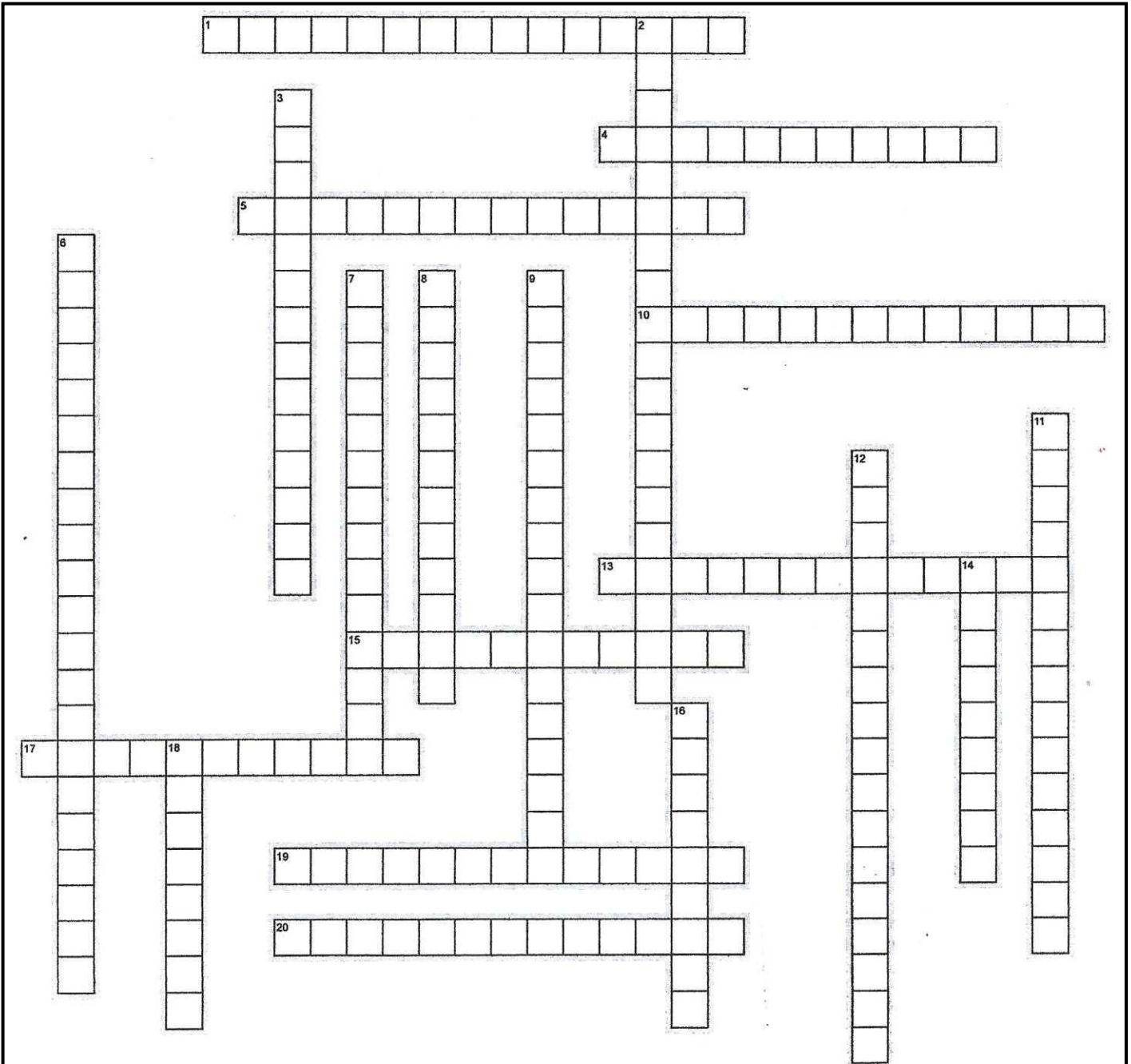
