
November's meeting took place at La Pizzaria. Members were asked to share female heroines from their reading of fiction or non~fiction books.



A Hot Topic ...

CENSORSHIP/BOOK BANNING

At the May 10, 2023, meeting of Book Review III, members and guests focused on the topic: "Books Under Fire," presented by Jessica Watkins, former Adult Services Reference Librarian at the Massillon Public Library. Jessica's presentation included this slide information:



There Is Nothing New Under the Sun

We think of this as something relatively new, but people have been trying to censor written records for as long as written records have existed!

Motivations vary, but are usually tied to political, religious or philosophical goals. This has always been the case.

Books targeted for censorship often deal with issues of race, religion, sexuality, gender identity, sexual orientation and politics.

The *Chatter* staff attended the presentation and subsequently determined the topic of censorship/banning books merited inclusion in *Chatter* this CCC year. In our series, we will provide recent findings published by The American Library Association (ALA) as well as share thoughts on these topics from our members who have served in the field of Library Sciences. Historically in 1953 the ALA issued the Freedom to Read Statement "a declaration in support of freedom to think or believe as one chooses, the freedom to express one's thoughts and beliefs without fear or retaliation, and the right to access. "Fittingly as this issue of *Chatter* goes to press, the annual ALA event celebrating the freedom to read, i.e. Banned Books Week is set for the week of October 1-7, 2023, emphasizing the theme "Let Freedom Read." Banned Books Week was launched in 1982. According to ALA "it highlights the value of free and open access to information." The resources listed below provide a website of the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom. Among the topics available are: The Top 13 Most Challenged Books for 2022, Censorship by the Numbers, and Banned Books Research Inquiries.

The American Library Association "compiles data on book challenges from reports filed by library professionals in the field and from news stories published throughout the United States. Because many book challenges are not reported to the ALA or covered by the press, the 2022 data compiled by ALA represents a snapshot of book censorship throughout 2022. A challenge to a book may be resolved in favor of retaining the book in the collection, or it can result in a book being restricted or withdrawn from the library."





6 apples, peeled & sliced ½ c. sugar 1 T cinnamon

APPLE CRISP

Virginia (Dean) Vana

1. c. brown sugar ½ c. margarine or butter

1 c. flour

Slice apples into a 9 x 13 inch cake pan sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Sprinkle with white sugar and cinnamon. Topping: Cover with a topping made of flour, brown sugar, and margarine. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Serve with ice cream or whipped cream, if desired.
